## **FULFORD AND THE CENSUS OF 1881**

When the 1881 census was conducted on Sunday and Monday, 3rd and 4th April, Fulford consisted of some 60 households of various types, 2 of which were uninhabited and 58 of which housed Fulfords 266 residents. Of the neighbouring villages and hamlets Hilderstone was slightly larger than Fulford with 66 households and 324 residents, whilst Saverley Green with 24 households and 98 residents, and Cross Gate, Meir Heath and Stallington with 10, 11 and 12 households housing 42, 65 and 78 residents respectively were smaller.

Fifty-four different surnames were recorded in Fulford in 1881, twenty of them (marked \*) also being recorded in the surrounding villages and hamlets. The surnames recorded in Fulford were:-

Unfortunately, apart from Stallington Hall, Hilderstone Hall, and the various inns in the area, the census doesn't identify any of the households either by road, number or name. However it may still be possible to get some idea of where the various households were located by following the enumerator's progress from property to property as he made his way through the village. He entered Fulford from Fulford Dale and made his way up through the village and on to Meir Heath. From there he went back to Stallington, then round to Saverley Green, and from there he returned to Fulford and made his way through the village, detouring briefly to Rushlade, and then went on to Hilderstone.

Fulford also had a Hall, Fulford Hall, the 18th century brick country house next to St.Nicholas Church. Four other 'large' buildings in the village were Fulford Manor Farm, also by the church, Ivy House Farm, Fulford Farm (now called Rocklands), and Olde House Farm. Fulford also had a pub, the 'Shoulder of Mutton', which was run by James Beard.

Being a small and isolated village one would expect to find the usual 'country' occupations represented amongst the inhabitants, and indeed the 1881 census did record the occupations of agricultural labourer, nurseryman's labourer, general labourer, dairy maid, farm servant, farmer, cowkeeper, gamekeeper, blacksmith, wheelwright, domestic servant, school master, wood ranger, innkeeper and stonemason. However in addition to these 'country' occupations there were also other occupations such as bootmaker, shoemaker, dressmaker, laundress, charwoman, nurse, butcher, provisions dealer, joiner and teacher, There were also three widows and two annuitants living in the village. Surprisingly there is no record of a vicar living in the Vicarage in Fulford, even though St.Nicholas Church had been consecrated in 1827. Similarly the school, which had been founded on the village green in 1785, is not mentioned, although three of the staff were living in the village. Sarah Windsor the schoolmistress, Annie Armishaw the pupil teacher, and Mary Porter the monitoress.

After 1881 the population of Fulford continued to grow and on 31st March 1897 Fulford became a Civil Parish. A summary of the 1881 census returns for Fulford is:-
